Vandalism of the church steps and Sanctuary doors

On Sunday November 24th at 9:15 p.m., individuals spray painted the front doors and rainbow steps of Trinity-St. Andrew's United Church. This is the second time the steps have been covered with grey paint in just over a year.

"It makes me sad to think there is so much fear out there," said Jeanette Cournoyer, Chair of the Trinity-St. Andrew's Affirm and Equity Committee. "It makes me realize that our work is not done, and we need to continue to offer a safe space

to all people in the Brighton community."

This past week our church has been a hub of love and support for the LGBTQ+ community, including this inclusive hymn sing (pictured in photo) from the East Central Ontario Regional Council meeting this past Saturday where ministers and worship leaders joined in solidarity. We also held a candlelight vigil on Transgender Day of Remembrance on Nov 20th and held a support group for family and friends of LGBTQ+ people earlier this month.

"I am so grateful for the ministry of this church," said Rev. Wanda Stride. "The rainbow steps represent God's beloved diversity, and a promise of safe-harbour for all people. I too am deeply saddened that people feel they need to deface and try to instill fear in people who are already feeling vulnerable." Trinity-St. Andrew's United Church volunteers worked tirelessly Tuesday to clean up the paint.

A candlelight vigil was held on Sunday, December 1st at 7:00 p.m. to pray for the people who committed this act of vandalism and to sing songs of peace and love.



Affirm and Equity Terminology for December

December 3rd is International Day of Persons with Disabilities. This month we focus on equity for people with disabilities. Celebrated around the world, this day mobilizes support for critical issues relating to the inclusion of persons with disabilities, promotes awarenessraising about disability issues and draws attention to the benefits of an inclusive and accessi-

ble society for all.

One example of change that is happening to help society embrace the energy and capabilities of disabled people is the **Accessible Icon Project**. Started in 2016, the Accessible Icon Project designed a new wheelchair icon that shows action and forward movement. One disabled person noted about the new icon "the chair is part of the person, the person isn't part of the chair!" Recently, the East Central Ontario Regional Council hosted a book study related to people living with disabilities. The book that we discussed is titled **My Body is Not a Prayer Request** by Amy Kenny. It is an eye-opening and informative read about the challenges and discrimination that disabled people face every day, written by a woman who has lived with a disability since a young age. We highly recommend this book if you want to better understand the lived experience of disabled people, especially as it relates to the oppression they face from organizations such as churches.



LGBTQ+ Family Support Group

The LGBTQ+ Family Support Group group's goal is to provide a safe, open and non-judgmental space for parents, grandparents and loved ones of LGBTQ+ family members to share experiences and support each other.

This group is loosely associated with the Cobourg/ Northumberland PFLAG

group (Parents and Friends of Lesbian and Gays (and Trans)) but operates as a stand-alone support group in Brighton.

Attendees at recent meetings have asked questions about topics such as the use of pronouns, gender re-assignment surgery, puberty blockers and more. We may not have all the answers, but we are good at listening and supporting!

The group meets the first Tuesday of each month from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. in the Quiet Room at the church. The next meetings are Tuesday, January 7 and February 4, 2025 For more information, contact brightonlgbtqgroup@gmail.com.

"And he will send out his angels to gather his chosen ones from all over the world—from the farthest ends of the earth and heaven." – Mark 13:27 (NLT) Ever notice how much of what is now considered standard in our society is the result of international movements which became global?

The American victory over the British in North America served as a great catalyst for the French Revolution in Europe.

The use of nonviolence as an effective weapon of peace in the Indian struggle against British Imperialism inspired the hopes and informed the strategies of Dr. King and all those who still fight against American oppression nonviolently. The tradition of *White Gift Sunday* has its roots in a small Methodist church in Ohio. The story is told that in 1904 the minister's wife as a way to reflect on love and care for the neighbour instead of focusing on receiving gifts, initiated a white gift Sunday. The focus rather than on receiving gifts shifted to bringing gifts to be shared with others.

All the gifts would come wrapped in white paper, so that no one would know which was an expensive or a more modest gift.

On December 8th we will continue the White Gift tradition by supporting the Legion's Angel Tree. Like last year we will focus on youth. You are asked to bring a gift, if you are able. We are not asking you to wrap it in white paper but we will have a white box at the front for you to drop off your gift. Also during the Holy Wondering time Trinity-St. Andrew's youth will collect gifts from those who do not wish to personally drop their gift in the box.

Some suggestions for gifts include gift cards for Subway, Tim Hortons, McDonald's, the Drug Store - for personal hygiene products, or warm mittens/gloves, hats and scarves.

At this point I had two choices, turn around and leave or pick up Abi (which was difficult on a rainy day when my arms don't work so well) and continue into the sanctuary with Hudson in tow. As you all know, I stayed. I truly believed that God had His hand in bringing me to this point so in we went.



He told us that he was the custodian and if we left a mess he would clean it up. I was so touched by this act of genuine welcoming. It has stuck with me and has manifested itself with everyone I have come to know here at TSAUC.

We will miss Barry's kind compassion, especially Abi who has become quite attached to him over the time. All the best thoughts and prayers go with him as he navigates a new way. Hopefully he will visit often and keep in touch.

I have encountered that when we say welcoming, we show it. It is not just a word on a spelling test but a life lived out.

Thank you Barry and Wanda and everyone for being the welcoming and caring people that God intended us all to be. Living out Jesus' words is visible through you all.
